

## An Important Centennial

Each February at M-DCPS, we are honored to celebrate the Black educators who elevate and sustain our school district. Their history and ongoing contributions have made us the third-largest school system in the nation and maintain our legacy as the best **CHOICE** for Miami's families.


This year marks a century of national commemorations of Black history. Dr. Carter Godwin Woodson (pictured) institutionalized the teaching, study, dissemination, and commemoration of Black history when he founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, now the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), on September 9, 1915.

In 1925, when Dr. Woodson planned the inaugural week-long observance of Black history, he could hardly have anticipated the imprint he would leave. From Negro History Week to Black History Month, the organization has carried forth the tradition, and the observances have become part American culture.

For this 100th theme, the founders of Black History Month urge communities to explore the impact and meaning of Black history and life commemorations in transforming the status of Black peoples in the

modern world.

When Dr. Woodson, as director of the Association, established Negro History Week, he did so as part of that tradition. Year after year, he built Negro History Week into an African American and American cultural institution. He set the themes and provided materials to illustrate the contributions people of African descent had made to the movement of history and modern culture.



On February 10, 1976, during the United States Bicentennial, President Gerald R. Ford became the first president to issue a message recognizing Black History Month. Then in 1986, Congress designated February as Black History Month. These efforts have made February the month when Black history finds its way not simply into cultural heritage sites and workplaces, but into American schools of across the land.

M-DCPS is proud to participate in this commemoration, acknowledging the generations of Black educators who helped build—and continue to maintain—the third largest school district in our great and diverse nation.
